

Bee swarm 'scares' family

Even loud annoying rock music was not enough to convince a swarm of thousands of bees to vacate a rural Acton home - it took a sprav of chemicals and a beekeeper's expertise to move the bees to a tree on the property.

The bees – "thousands and thousands" of them – invaded Wendy Williams' Third Line residence about two weeks ago, cramming themselves into a crack at the eaves where the garage and house meet.

"We tried to lure them

into a hive box with honey and sugar water and my husband attached a honey-covered knife to the swimming pool pole and tried to transfer them from the side of the house to the hive box, but that really didn't work," Williams said on Monday.

After about a week of trying to move them, they finally spraved a little poison into an area where the garage meets the side of the house. "We think that they

moved to a tree further down our driveway - there are still a few

buzzing around the hole at the eaves that we have to plug."

Williams said when she first heard the bees, she thought it was a neighbouring farmer working in the field.

"The humming just kept getting louder and louder and I looked and saw this swarm in the sky over the garage. I took my video camera out but my hand was shaking so badly that I had to get the tripod," Williams said, adding they were lucky that no one was stung.

Williams said they were

told that bees didn't like vibrations so they played loud rock music and banged on the wall to try to convince the bees to leave, but that didn't work, and they couldn't use their back door because of the swarm.

"It was scary having them around the house. There are still a few lingering around over the driveway, and we can hear them in the tree, but most have moved away from the house," Williams said, adding that they had a similar, but smaller problem, with bees last summer.
