School safety

Already, days before school begins, roads near Acton schools are busier as teachers prep their classes and students registered at the High School.

It's a time when safety needs to be underscored as kids, excited about seeing their friends and starting a new school year, may not pay as much attention to their safety as they should.

Police forces urge caution for motorists in and around schools – they will step up enforcement over the coming weeks to ensure that drivers slow down, obey traffic rules and are careful to look out for students who have had a summer of fun and may need some rule re-enforcement.

Reminders for Motorists:

- Slow down. Observe the speed limit in school zones.
- Be especially careful when driving around school zones. Always expect the unexpected.
- Be alert for youngsters walking to and from school as you back out of your driveway or leave your garage.
- •Watch for children on bicycles, especially at intersections and driveways.
- Stop your car when you see lights flashing on a school bus. Don't start driving until the red lights stop flashing. Safety Tips for Pedestrians:
- Always walk on the sidewalk if there's no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, always walk FACING traffic.
 - Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks.
 - Stop at the curb, or the edge of the road.
 - Walk in groups, there is safety in numbers.
- Stop and look left, then right, then left again, before you step into the street.

Slow down, pay attention and be safe.
