New home for Globe The Town continues to help non-profit groups save important local heritage buildings with grants, cheap long term nominal fee leases and by conveying ownership of the buildings

to citizen groups. Like the deal that helped Heritage Acton rehabilitate Acton's Town Hall Centre, the Town will deed the former Georgetown Armoury to Georgetown Globe Musical Productions so it can be restored. The Georgetown Fairgrounds land where the Armoury sits will be leased to Globe for 20 years at \$2 per year with an automatic renewal every five years.

Globe spokesperson, Acton business owner Lois Fraser said she was "beyond excited" to finalize the deal because it seemed like a "pipe dream" that Globe would find a home. Globe has already put \$200,000 into the building. Like it did for Heritage Acton, the Town will redirect almost


