Household Hazardous Waste Not In the Garbage, Not Down the Drain

Household hazardous waste can injure waste collectors, and can damage the environment if disposed of improperly. Household hazardous waste must not be put in the garbage or poured down the



Household hazardous waste is usually labelled as corrosive, explosive, poison or flammable, and includes materials such as antifreeze, batteries, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs), fluorescent tubes, garden chemicals, household cleaners, motor oil and filters, paint, and propane tanks.

Household hazardous waste can be dropped off free of charge at the Halton Waste Management Site, 5400 Regional Road 25, Milton. There is a 20 litre maximum per visit. No commercial hazardous waste can be accepted. The Site is open Monday to Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
