Concerns with Catholic Grade 3 EQAO results

St. Joseph's Vice-principle Claire Lanois, who splits her time with Holy Cross in Georgetown, said they remain "steadfast in our commitment to learning" that has helped them "maintain the provincial benchmark" for Grade six students for the past five years.

"This year in particular, we know that we need to focus on specific strategies to increase our writing scores, and overall, we're pleased with our progress," Lanois on Friday, adding they are "disheartened by the Primary (Grade three) results, and will "continue to strive to improve

looking for best practices and aligning the school improvement plan.


'In the coming weeks we are working with staff to evaluate strengths and weaknesses in our performance, and to focus upon next steps for improvement," Lanois said, adding they expected better Grade three reading results after putting in a lot of team planning and effort, including bringing in parent volunteers, to provide a lot of opportunities for reading.

In the coming weeks, Lanois said they would share the EQAO information with the parent council and the school community.

At the high school

level, 2,393 Catholic Grade nine students took one of two versions of the EQAO math test in the spring, including Acton area students who attend Christ the King in Georgetown where results for both the Academic and Applied students exceeded Board and provincial results.

Eighty-seven percent of Grade nine Academic students achieved a Level three – equal to a "B" or better – result, compared with 86 per cent at the Board and 82 per cent across the province. Fifty per cent of CTK Applied math students performed at Level three or better, compared with 48 per cent at the Board and 41 per cent across Ontario.
