Streamlined development process

Less bureaucracy and a streamlined, less expensive development process are the benefits of a new Site Plan Control policy approved recently by Guelph/Eramosa Township Council.

Site plans are a development tool allowing municipalities to control issues like entrances, parking, loading areas and landscaping for new buildings, alterations to existing site plans and major renovations. Single family homes, semi-detached dwellings and agricultural buildings are exempt from the Site Plan Control process.

Until now, a site plan application, with a \$2,560 fee and deposit, was required for all development, regardless of its size or impact. With the new policy, Council delegates approval for "minor" site plans to the CAO and/or Clerk, without requiring a full site plan application and Council approval.

When several councillors expressed concern over what would be deemed a "minor" application, staff explained new criteria only allows applications with an existing Site Plan Agreement, and to be minor, an

application must comply with current zoning bylaws and not increase the size of a building by more than 30 per cent.

Until now, site plans have not been required in the agricultural area, but the new policy requires site plans for developments like country markets that have a visitor component, including parking and landscaping.

Mayor Chris White said the new policy would reduce bureaucracy and shows the Township is "a little more open for business."

OPP Auxiliary Unit Celebrates 50th Anniversary

The Ontario Provincial Police Auxiliary program marked its 50th Anniversary this year. The OPP Auxiliary originally formed in 1960 by an Order-in-Council. Known prior to that as the Emergency Measures Organization, members were trained in crowd control and first aid in the event of a nuclear attack from Russia.

The current members of the County of Wellington OPP Auxiliary Unit have dedicated thousands of hours of volunteer work last year. Members locally support and help organize Child Safety Seat Inspection Clinics, food drives and they are involved in many community events County wide.

The duties of the Auxiliary unit are never ending. They continually assist in traffic control, ground security at major events, seat belt clinics, assisting with RIDE initiatives, bicycle rodeos, safety displays and presentations, foot and road patrol, search and rescue, marine and ceremonial duties.

County of Wellington OPP Inspector Scott Smith said, "The Auxiliary Program benefits the community and the OPP organization as a whole. Without these dedicated members, many special events and operational needs would be negatively impacted. These Auxiliary officers contribute substantially to the public safety, education and awareness of the residents throughout Wellington County. The values and commitment these members bring to the organization is something that cannot be measured. I thank the members of our unit for their continued dedication."
