So moved by the prose, a Rockwood teacher will send a Remembrance Day poem, written by a 13-year-old student, to her husband who is serving in Afghanistan.

Lindsay Christopher, a Grade eight student at Rockwood Centennial School, wrote the poem for an English class assignment and made such an impression that she was asked to read it at the village's Re-

membrance Day ceremony last Thursday. "It (the poem) just came to me—it's called Risking their Lives to Fight for You and it came to me while I was thinking about Remembrance Day," Christopher said on Sunday, adding she has several American family members in the U.S. Navy, and her cousin, Anthony Price, formerly of Acton, was injured in Afghanistan.

Christopher said the solemn service at the Rockwood Cenotaph did not make her nervous because she "likes the spotlight" and recited her poem from the heart, to be told later by several Veterans how much it meant to them. This is Christopher's poem:

Risking Their Lives to Fight For You The people who go to war are just like me and you Sisters, brothers, moms and dads too Risking their lives to fight for you.

Grabbing their guns and heading to war
Even though they've had little sleep
and are very sore
They don't care the tinniest bit
