Printing Trades Production Lower

According to the 1933 report on the printing trades issued by the Dominion Burcau of Statistics, dealt with this peril with a stern hand, the printing trades of the Dominion have suffered quite a loss in production in comparison with the previous year. Total production in the printing done, made it the more unpardonable trades in Canada during 1933 reached a value of \$92,715,339, a decrease of over eight million dollars from the output of \$101,492,333 reported in 1932. The 2,075 establishments engaged in this line of manufacture represented a capital investment \$120,003,518, and gave employment to an average of 32,031 employees.
