Construction contracts awarded in Canada during February totalled \$10,672,200, according to figures released by MacLean Building Reports Ltd. Building activities were greatest in the Province of Ontario, where 338 contracts, aggregating \$8,792,100 were awarded. Of the total contracts awarded, engineering projects accounted for \$4,401,900 and business construction accounted for \$4,306,600, which included contracts for 73 public buildings with a value of \$3,267,700.
