Sunday Radio Advertising

Spot radio advertising on Sundays will be eliminated over all Canadian stations leginning May 5th, the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission announced on Tuesday. The ban will not apply to time signals and certain public services. The question of excluding sales talks on Sunday broadcasts will be given further consideration. Chairman Hector Charlesworth, of the Commission, sent to all station managers u memorandum informing them. "The question of the legality under the terms of the Lord's Day Act of all forms of Sunday adverdising has been raised by various influential organizations in Quebec, Ontarlo and other provinces, and the Commission hopes to remove the main cause of complaint.
