15 cup dried apricots

3 cups apricot juice and water 14 cup quick-cooking taploca

14 cup granulated sugar 14 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

14 teaspoon salt 2 slices canned pineapple finely cut

15 cup pineapple juice

14 tablespoon lemon juice Cut apricots in half, cover with water and soak 2 hours. Cover, and simme 15 minutes, or until tender. measure liquid and add enough water to make 3 cups. Combine with apricots an remaining ingredients in greased baking dish, mixing thoroughly. Bake in mod erate oven (375 degrees P.) 30 minutes or until done, stirring every 10 minutes and again when removing from oven Serve with cream. Serves 8.

# CONTROL OF BROWN HEART IN: TURNIPS

Brown heart is becoming a menace to the growing of turnips in many parts of Canada. It has been reported from the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Onturlo and British Columbia. Affected turnins are unfit for table use. Unlike many other diseases there are no signs of the trouble evident on the tops and the outside of the bulb, therefore, it is necessary to cut into the turnip to detect the symptoms. In the early stages brown heart appears as a water soaked spot generally in the centre of the bulb. Usually the symptoms are not noticeable until the turnip is about two and onehalf to three inches in diameter. In advanced stages the greater part of the flesh of the turnip may show a brownish discoloration. In certain cases affected parts break down forming a cavity while in others a soft rot develops which may destroy the turnip. 
