BRITISH CANNED GOODS EXPORT ED IN BIG QUANTITIES

Imports of canned and bottled fruits into the United Kingdom established an all-time high during 1934, showing an increase of 8.3 per cent. over the privious year, and 31 per cent, as compared with the average for the five years, 1929-1933, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. As regards pineupples, supplies from Empire countries increased to 94 per cent., other varieties to 25 per cent. Empire countries supplied 44 per cent, of the aggregate of all varieties. The most important item insofar as Canada is concerned is pears. followed by gallon apples. Loganberries come next in point of volume, followed by apple pectin, plums, cherries, peaches and strawberries.

CANNED FOODS POPULAR

Developments of the canned foods industry in Canada in recent years has affected great changes in the relation of foods to seasons. To the consumer the has made Yruits and vegetables of many kinds available at all times of the year. not always with all the charm of the freshly-gathered products, but with much of their original freshness and flavor. Producers have been provided with an enormously extended market, which has resulted in a large and rapid increase in the volume of fruit and vegetable production. Fresh vegetables for use in the camping industry increased from 157 allion pounds in 1021 to 311 million pounds in 1932. Production made a further gain in 1933, being estimated for that year at 6,452,000 cases compared with 6.176,000 cases in 1933, and preliminary figures for 1934 place the pack carned vegetables at approximately

305,323,530 pounds. Canadian canned fruits and vevetables are enjoying increasing popularity abroad as well as at home. Improved quality of canned foods, which are produced under the supervision of the Canadian Government, has been an important factor in increasing the domestic consumption as well as onening the door to expanding foreign markets. Exports of practically all canned fruits and vegetables show ncreases, and reflect the esteem lu which Canadian canned goods are held n world markets. Exports of both caned fruits and vegetables increased from value of \$1,704,103 in 103 to \$2,409,-054 in 1034.
