SOMETHING NEW IN CHEESE CAKE

CHEESE CAKE

- 1 cup butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 5 egg yolks (well beaten), 2 teaspoons lemon juice...

CORN FLAKE PASTRY

- 1 cup corn flake crumbs, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons sugar

Back in the June of half a century ago there were many of the same kind happening that have their counterparts in the activities of to-day.

Owing to the expense incurred in the Northwest Rebellion it was felt, advisable not to have camp at Niagara that year—1885. Here are some other gleanings:

"The town bell now rings at 8 p. m. to notify our merchants that the time for closing has arrived."

"Wool is being purchased on Guelph market for 17c and 18c."

At County Council yesterday, Mr. Alex. McMillan, of Rockwood, was appointed Public School Inspector...

"In the Court of Revision two appeals were heard, one by Dr. McGarvin, and the other by the G. T. R. No decision was reached at the first meeting."

"New front fences are being erected by Mr. Peter McNab, Mr. John Matthews, Mr. A. E. Nicklin and the Public School residence property."

"The County Council of 1885 had to raise \$11,799.92 and this amount was divided as follows: Trafalgar, \$3,441.83; Exeter, \$3,404.15; Nelson, \$2,345.93; Nassauwexya, \$1,511.64; Milton, \$230.72; Oakville, \$305.85; Georgetown, \$217.92; Acton, \$181.36; Burlington, \$167.38."

"The pound-keeper has handled a good many cattle and sheep the past week."

"Overcoats were brought into regulation on Monday evening. This after a sweltering Sunday." (June 8th).

"Potatoes are almost a drug on the market. First class potatoes can be purchased here for 25 cents a bag."

In the Brampton Hand Contest on Queen's birthday, Norval won the first prize of \$30.00, and Breckville the second of \$20."

"The G. T. R. has arranged for an accommodation each east and west in addition to the regular train service."

"Canvassers are at work securing subscriptions for a big demonstration in Acton on July 1st, with a prize list offering \$300."

"Messrs. Moore and McGarvin have secured the whole of the premises recently vacated by the Canada Globe Works for their satchel and purse business."

"Barn raisings are now frequent in this vicinity. Within a couple of weeks three fine barns have been raised by Messrs. Joel Leslie, David Williamson and Thomas Cameron. Others are progressing."

"There was frost on Monday night (June 8th). The weather hasn't changed according to season very much. Garden parties were popular in '85, too, but we didn't have to have as much program then as now. They were considered as social gatherings and we entertained ourselves a bit as well as being entertained. I think the affairs of those days were really garden parties, and to-day that same so-called events

might more aptly be called an outdoor concert.

Gardens are coming along fine these days and so are the weeds, and I'm kept fairly active, so that will be all for this week.

FOREST FIRE CONTROL

In future forest supervisors in Canadian forests will be armed with a slide rule, charts and tables which it is believed will be of great assistance in estimating from day to day the degree of fire hazard, and will thus enable them to take more effective precautionary measures.

In a country with forest and climatic conditions like Canada the problem of how to reduce losses from forest fires is ever in the foreground. These losses average more than \$9,500,000 per year without making any allowance for loss in soil fertility, loss in scenic value and through floods, soil erosion, and the lowering of water levels in streams, all of which are the inevitable results of extreme forest denudation.

Investigations carried on during the past five years at the Petawawa Forest Experiment Station as to the way in which fires started by lightning or human agency spread and destroy timber show that in pine forests the fuel in which fires start is the mat of dead pine needles and twigs which covers the forest floor and which is commonly called "duff."

In a mixed red pine and white pine forest, fires will not start or spread when the top layer of duff contains more moisture than 23 per cent. of its weight. There are instruments which show what the percentage of water in the duff is and tables and charts have been worked out which indicate the effect upon these moisture conditions of rain, temperature, wind, and evaporation, and embodying these results a slide rule has been designed which does not require mathematical ability in order to operate it.

A knowledge of the daily degree of fire hazard as revealed by a fire hazard chart will be of incalculable value to forest supervisors of the Dominion Forest Service in detailing the work of forest employees engaged on construction or improvements so that they will be immediately available for fire duty if the inflammability warrants; in determining the number of men necessary to send to a fire; in regulating the issuance or cancellation of permits to burn slash or forest debris issued to settlers and others so that burning may be conducted in safe periods, and in regulating the travel in and use of forests by the public and the frequency of forest patrols.

QUEER WILLS

It is reported that a certain will has been offered to be sealed up for all time in absolute privacy because of certain passages in it respecting people of whom the testator does not appear to have had a good opinion. Many wills now in the great depository at Somerset House could show some weird and scathing passages. Short of absolute scandal our courts often have to examine the whimsicalities of testators as set down in their "last testaments."

PAVING-STONES AS SCHOOL FEES

THE 32nd SHEEP COUNTRY

As a result of the Government lamb feeding policy by which young Western lambs are made ready in Eastern Canada for market, much more lamb is being eaten in Canada than formerly, of the same time, in spite of the advance of the basic for lamb, Canadian lambs are among the smallest consumers of mutton and lamb among the great nations.

With regard to the consumption of other foods, Canada is second to none, and in fact with respect to eggs is far and away the egg-eating champion of the world. Probably the reason for the deficiency in lamb eating is to be found in the smallness of the Canadian flock and in the fact that hitherto sheep have been bred principally for the sake of their wool.

FIRST PRINTING HOUSE

In Mainz on the Rhine still stands the first printing house of the world. It is the Schoefferhof, formerly known as the Hof zum Humbrecht, in which the father of printing Johannes Gutenberg, first put his invention to practical use.

Here he printed his famous Bible of 42 Lines also known as the "Mazarin Bible," his first calendars and the "Poem On The Day of Judgment." Among the few remaining mementoes of Gutenberg in Mainz is the Gutenberg Museum, founded in 1900, which contains the reconstructed workshop of the inventor, complete with reproductions of the primitive wooden printing blocks and implements used by the pioneer of printing over 500 years ago.

SUGGEST ATTEMPT TO DOMESTICATE MOOSE

High withered, long-legged moose that browse off the mountain willow may one day be mixed with the horses on the Black Cat Ranch at Brule, Alberta, which Fred Brewster, of Jasper, is opening for guests on July 1st.

"The moose," says Major Fred Brewster, widely known as a Rocky Mountain guide and rancher, "is the natural beast of burden in many parts of Canada. While much of Canada is ideal for the horse in the summer, the winters in the mountain areas are severe for an animal which, after all, originated in a much warmer climate than ours and was first imported into the southern latitudes of the continent.

"The moose" is strong and with care should be adaptable both for riding and for driving purposes. The one or two attempts at his domestication which I know have been definitely successful, but there were individual cases, where at most two of these animals were involved.

As compared to the horse the moose would have the advantage in the winter time of finding his food on the tips of willows above the snow. He would not have to be fed, nor to paw through to the frozen ground. In addition, continues Major Brewster, the moose can make his way through snow in which a horse is completely helpless.

"My notion is to catch two or three calves and let my men, who are used to the handling of horses, work upon them," he says. "The problem should not be too difficult, as moose, along with deer, mountain sheep and goat, use the same range as our horses. Should permission for such an experiment be necessary, I would apply to the Provincial authorities who might well be interested in its success."

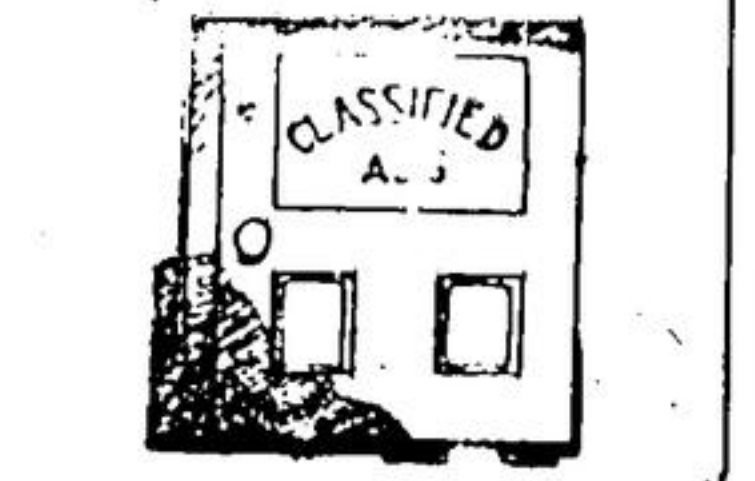
