If there is to be a bride in your family and it is your happy task to provide a buffet wedding breakfast-no doubt you are wondering what to serve as a sweet. time it must be a dessert which makes it easy for the guests to help themselves. These strawberry tarts are the creation of a famous chef, and are entirely worthy of even such an occasion great as a wedding luncheon-or breakfast, if you choose to call it so.

AMBASSADOR STRAWBERRY TARTS I cup cream, whipped

I cup egg white, stiffly beaten

cup sugar 14 teaspoon vanilla

114 cups moist, sweetened coconut 1 cup sweetened sliced strawberries

o baked 34-inch tart shells Combine cream, egg, sugar, vanilla and I cup coconut. Place strawberries in bottom of tart shells, pile cream mixture on fruit, and sprinkle with remaining coconut. If desired, place one whole strawberry on each tart before sprinkling with coconut. Serve at once. Serves

MINT ICE CREAM

2 cups milk . 15 pound after dinner mints I junket tablet

1 tablespoon cold water

1 cup heavy cream Grape green color

Put the junket tablet in a cup with cold water. Crush with a spoon to dissolve. But mints in mixture of cream and milk. Stir well, and warm to lukewarm-not hot. Add the dissolved junket tublet. Stir a few seconds. Pour at once into freezer can. Let stand undisturbed in warm room until firm-about 10 minutes. Chill, and when ready to pack and freeze add a few drops of grape green color.

THE SAVORY SAUSAGE Too many cooks neglect the humble sausage-Yailing to realize that it lends itself to exceptionally attractive dishes. Here are two sample recipes:

> SPANISH SAUSAGE I pound pork sausage

6 small green peppers 1 cup bread crumbs

1 cup tomatoes I onlon, grated 1 cup diced celery

onion, and diced celery. Molsten with tomatoes. Cut tops off green peppers, remove seeds and parboll for five minutes. Stuff with sausage mixture and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees P.) for thirty minutes.

USES OF LIMESTONE

Dozens of Industries Require It in Process

of Manufacture. Limestone is obtainable in more than 1.500 localities in Canada, much of it of fine quality. In addition to its use as a building stone and for roads, railway ballast and concrete aggregate, limestone is used for many purposes. It is the principal raw material in the manufacture of Portland cement, and also in the manufacture of calcium carbide and cyanamide. which latter are the bases of many chemical products.

The iron and steel industry, as at present constituted, could not exist if limestone were not available to free the iron from its ores. In the production of gold, silver and other metals, lime and limestone play important parts. Quantities of lime are

used in tanning leather. Limestone is indispensable to the pulp and paper industry-every piece of paper is made by its aid. So, too, does the glass industry require limestone for most of its products-particularly for window glass. Liffestone is essential to the manufacture of washing sods, baking sods and many other chemicals. Large quantities are used in the refining of sugar. The uses of lime for plaster, mortar and whitewash are generally known:

When limestone is pulverized and mixed with linseed oil it is known as putty. Pulverized limestone is also used in the compounding of rubber for footwear and flooring. It is used in oilcloth and in coldwater paints. Some cigarette papers contain as much as 30 per cent. pulverized

Limestone is a source of carbon dioxide gas which, when compressed into the solid state, forms the refrigerant known as drytype of limestone when melted in a small blast furnace and blown by high-pressure steam into myriads of fibres, yields a Buffy material known as rock wool-one of the most efficient insulating materials on the market.

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
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
