conducting the journal for two years, Mr. Hacking sold out to T. Albert Moore (now the Right Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore) and E. W. Galbraith. In July, 1878, H. P. Moore went into partnership with his brother, Dr. Moore, and a year later assumed full control of The Free Press. Until March, 1922, Mr. Moore retained control of The Free Press, when the present editor, G. A. Dills, was taken into partnership. Mr. Moore's life was devoted to Acton and its newspaper. His ability and untiring efforts built a newspaper of outstanding merit. For forty-nine years he occupied the editorial chair with ability and untiring zeal.

For five years the partnership was carried on, and since March, 1927, the present editor has endeavored to carry on Acton's newspaper and maintain the standards set for it by its former worthy editors. It was a great regret that just four years after relinquishing control of The Free Press Mr. Moore passed away, mourned by the town that had known him since his birth and the newspaper field that catered him so highly. It was another keen regret that Mrs. Moore was not able, through ill health, to attend the little birthday arrangements on Friday.

This week we start The Free Press on its sixty-first year. Of the four former editors, only one survives—Right Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, now of Toronto, a man who left The Free Press to enter the Christian ministry, and by his untiring efforts and ability has been chosen to fill the highest position in the church of his choice. The office is indeed proud to name him on all occasions as the first apprentice in the printing trade in Acton, incidentally his interest in Acton and The Free Press has never waned and in his busy life he has often found time to write and offer kindly encouragement on various occasions to the present editor.

We will just give a personal word about the present staff. The editor came to Acton at the age of six months. Our years of school life were spent in Acton and on May 25th, 1909, we began our apprenticeship in the printing trade. After four years we journeyed to Toronto, then to Amsterdam and Schenectady, N. Y., and finally New York City. Here we learned of modern and improved printing methods. We spent a few months on the old Guelph Herald and the Canadian Freeman, published at Kingston, as linotype operator. Then, in December, 1917, we returned to Acton and The Free Press. The years intervening are known to you all in our association, with Acton's newspaper. The present staff comprises E. H. Vincent, foreman and linotype operator who also began his apprenticeship on The Free Press in December, 1911. He likewise worked at the printing trade in Toronto and Chatham, and returned to the office in March, 1927 to become foreman when the present editor took charge. Robert MacArthur has been on the staff since January, 1927, and James McGeachie since April, 1929, so that the entire staff is a well experienced one. Miss M. S. Nelson, who has charge of the office, has been a member of the staff since February, 1929.
