Celebration in Acton Biggest in Years

The Word; Jesus, the assurance; Jesus, the friend.
In closing Dr. Morrow stated that he hoped to be able to speak Jesus on each and every occasion possible. He also wanted to be a neighbor and friend of every citizen of Acton and the surrounding community, and to be able to call each and every one by name.
The Acton Citizens' Band led the music during the singing of the hymns, and also rendered the melody of hymns, "When Love Shines In," during the receiving of the offerings, which was a generous one, and will be used for relief purposes in Acton.
The service ended with the singing of "Abide With Me," and the benediction.
By nine o'clock, and before the call-thumpans were assembling from all sections of town and countryside. And what a collection was in the Park when Marshall McQuarrie gave the word to march off. The parade wended its way up Knox Avenue, Bower Avenue to Guelph Street, Mill and Wellington to Queen Street, by Young Street to Mill Street, then to Willow, Church and Main Streets, and back to the park. The route was lined with spectators and it was difficult to judge which enjoyed the proceedings most, paraders or spectators.
Immediately following Marshall McQuarrie and his mount came James Johnson, from Nasagaweya, with his team of oxen, hauling a float depicting a century ago, and incidentally Mr. Johnson is only eight years from his hundredth birthday himself.
Then came one of the clown bands, the Slumse Twins; Ritchie & Agar; float; Mickey Mouse family; A. H. Bishop & Son; "Hiram" Buckshaw (in policeman's uniform); Lakeland Chapter, I. O. O. F.; Sigh Lantburg and his Acton Lunatics, dispensing their own brand of syncope; the quintuplets; the Little School House; a couple more in costume, and the Acton Branch of the Canadian Legion float—a jolly crowd with their own song and music.
The 1890 model, another decorated car, and a circus float, with band; the joys and the old-timers of 1800; the fire plug; with and goats; and a pony team all had a place. The Acton division of the Lorne Elites had an artistic and appropriate float entered and another one was a boat, "Tona," with sailor lassies and another jazz band to liven up the parade, with Gordon Cook as the seven-foot drum major, the presentation was of a high order. A children's section had a variety of costumes beyond description. Then came the decorated bicycles, doll carriages, more comic and variety in costume, and finally the milk maid and her cow.
It was the finest parade ever put on locally and the enthusiasm with which all entered into the spirit of the affair was creditable.

Brampton took the lead at the first of the game, but when the Guelph girls got going they shoved some runs across and gave Brampton a close tussle. There was a large crowd on hand from both Guelph and Brampton, and both teams had all kinds of support.
Motorcycle races, bicycle and running races featured the track during the afternoon, and provided thrills and spills aplenty. The sharp curve at the west end of the track claimed many a rider before the afternoon was over, but fortunately none were seriously injured. The Acton Citizens' Band again provided splendid numbers on the program

as well as the Cowboy artists. The crowd was another record breaker, and the booths had a sell-out.
The final event was the street dance, with the Cowboy Orchestra. Like all the other events, it was packed, both on the dancing area and by the spectators.
And for those who became tired about the dance, a parade, not scheduled, was formed and the exuberance of the paraders went unbounded in their walk up and down the streets. It was a real celebration and re-union. We take off our hats to those in charge of arrangements.

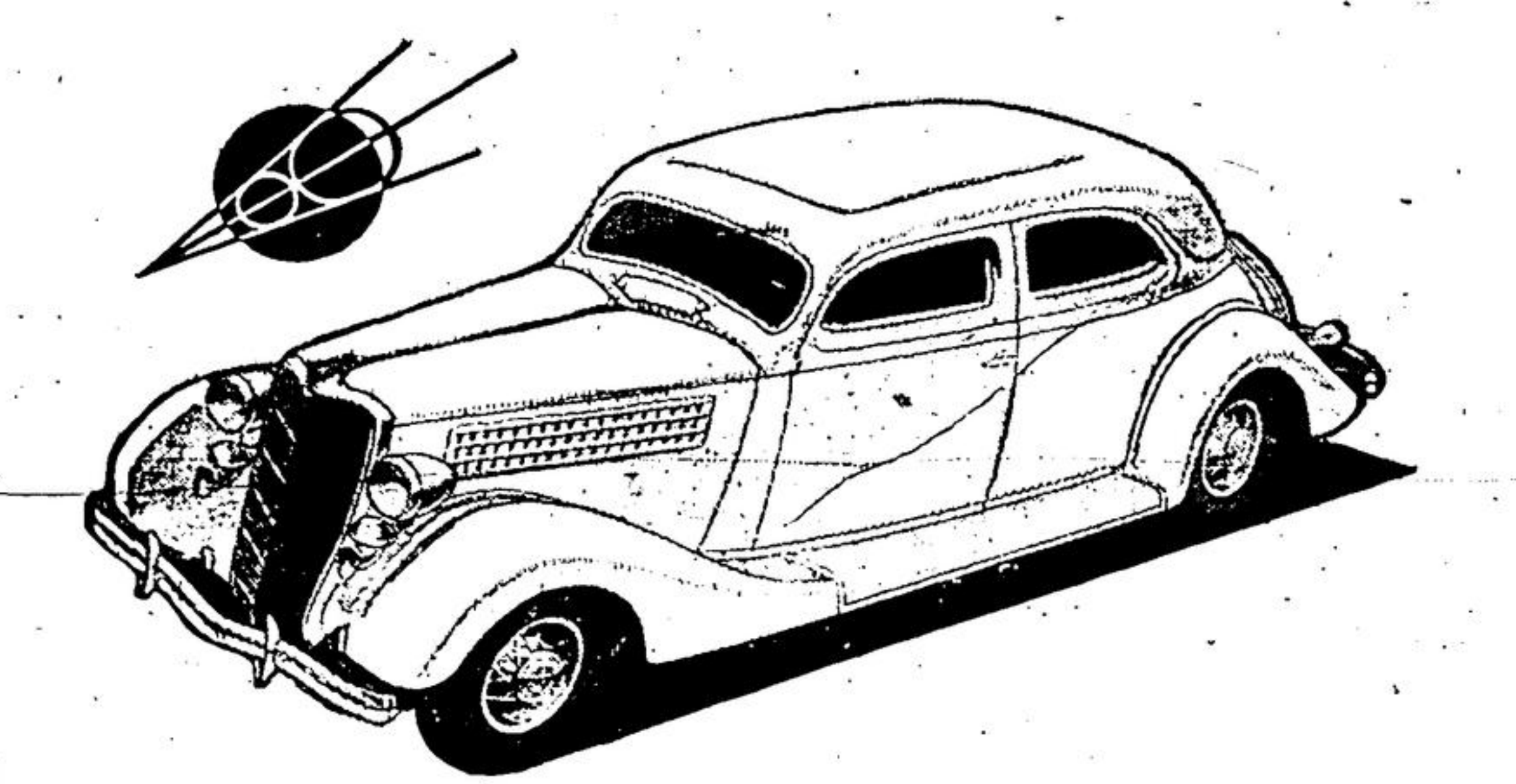

Peel County Ex-Warden Dies Following Accident

Edward A. Orr, 71, ex-warden of Peel County, died at his home in Oakville, of injuries received in a motor accident. He was born on a farm on the Dundas highway, moved to Clarkson at an early age, and later to Oakville. He has served as Councillor and Reeve of Toronto Township, and as Councillor of Trafalgar Township. His widow, five sons and one daughter, matron of the Hospital for Crippled Children, Montreal, survive.
