HARVEST THANKSGIVING

The blessing of the rice harvest, one of the most ancient of Ceyloness customs, and the oldest harvest-thanksgiving ceremony in the Middle East, has just taken place near Colombo. Twentythree elephants and over five thousand villagers participated. The ceremony is known as "Aluth-Sal-Mangalla." It begins with a procession to the temple, and then proceeds to the paddy (rice) fields attached to the temple, where the high priest reaps a small quantity of paddy. This is heaped on the leading elephant, and the procession starts backagain to the temple, where the priests thresh the grains. The rice is then bolled and offered to Buddha. Immediately afterwards the villagers begin the
