The balance of \$284.52 be paid from general accounts. Education Committee—A communication was read from Peel County in answer to a request from Halton that the Education Committees of the two Counties meet and discuss problems arising from pupils attending High Schools outside of their own County.

The letter ran, in part, as follows: "We are instructed to say that in our opinion a joint meeting of the Education Committees of the two Counties would not result in a satisfactory arrangement and that in any case the approval of the Council of the two Counties would have to be obtained to any agreement that might result from a meeting of the Committees."

Halton Education Committee recommended that the account to Streetsville be paid and that the Clerk write to the Minister of Education regarding this legislation.

It was moved by Mr. Currie, seconded by Mr. Irvine, that the report, as considered and amended by Committee of the Whole, be adopted.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Harris, seconded by Mr. Brecken, that the following accounts be paid: Finance \$1,660.49; County Buildings 129.06; Hospital accounts 1,631.00; Printing 173.95; Education 41.73; Good Roads 284.52.

—Carried. A by-law, to authorize the borrowing of money to meet current expenses, was given the required number of readings and passed after which Council adjourned, to meet at the call of the Warden.

RECORD BUTTER OUTPUT

Saskatchewan creameries had a banner year in 1934, when a new high record was established in creamery butter. Record was established in creamery butter qualifying for first grade was higher than in any previous year.

Creamery butter production reached an all-time high figure of 20,878,352 pounds, an increase of 1,000,810 pounds, or 5.1 per cent, over 1933, the previous high year. The production of both factory cheese and ice cream was slightly lower than in the previous year, but these decreases were more than offset by the increase in other lines. Milk production was just over one and a half billion pounds and showed an increase of slightly more than 50 million pounds over the year 1933.

Saskatchewan's surplus dairy production has for many years been almost all manufactured in the form of creamery butter which is marketed outside the province, mainly in cities of Eastern Canada, with a small percentage going to Pacific coast markets. This butter is sold in competition with the best produced in Canada and, while the quality of Saskatchewan creamery butter has been very satisfactory and has shown steady improvement in recent years, further improvement in quality is again shown in 1934. Of the 15,909,864 pounds of butter graded by Federal Dairy Produce Graders during the year 87.3 per cent. qualified for first grade compared with 83.1 per cent. in 1933 and 78.4 per cent. in 1932. This improvement, which depended on careful work in the manufacturing plants, is in a large measure due to improvement in the quality of the cream as delivered from the farms. The percentage of cream qualifying for the two top grades has increased by 0.6 percent in the last two years.

The total value of dairy production in Saskatchewan increased from \$13,666,900 in 1933 to \$14,219,400 in 1934.

Moved by N. A. Robinson, seconded by L. L. Mullin, that this Council do now adjourn, to meet Tuesday, November 12th, at 1.30 p. m., at the call of the Reeve.—Carried.
