OSPRINGE

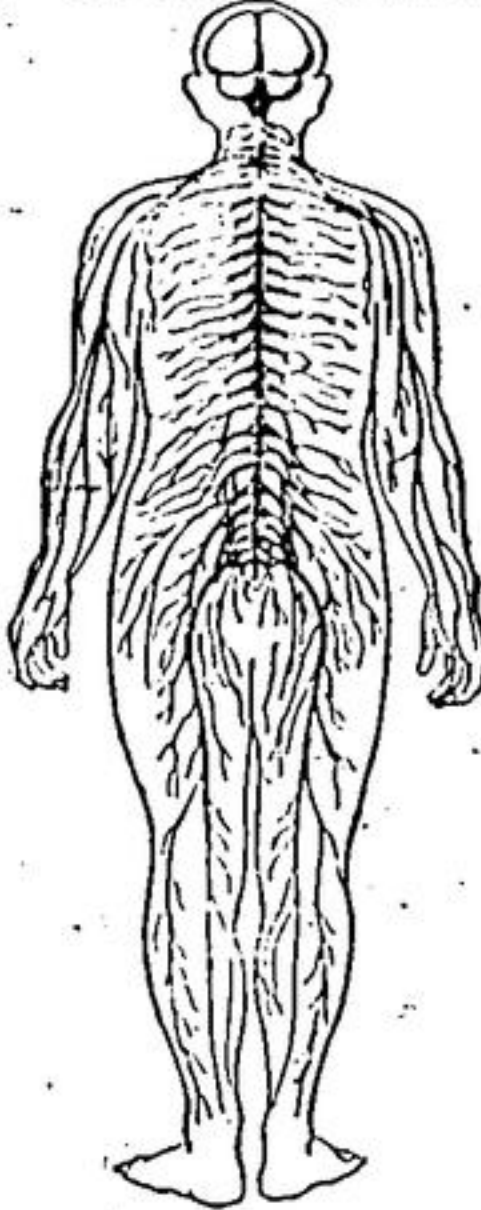
A farwell party was held on Monday evening for Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Tandy, who are moving to Carleton Place.
