Group Finals are Delayed

Oakville and Guelph Given Permission to Have Home and Home Games for Second Place, and Plenty of Time to Do It

Oakville came from behind and defeated Guelph in two straight games to tie them up for second place in the League the past week. They won in Guelph by 7-2 and in Oakville by 6-1. This gave them an even 8 points each.

The O.J.A. announced the game for Monday night and without any apparent reason, it was played on Tuesday night. It means that Acton, who finished the group on Friday night, will have to wait a week and a half to meet one of these teams, and the group winner cannot be declared before February 17th, which is just about two weeks behind the time set by the O.J.A.

WANT CANADA'S HORSES FOR HOME AND ABROAD

The necessity to make good the deficit of horses in Canada consequent on the decline of horse breeding in the years prior to 1932 and the fact that there is a market abroad for Canadian horses are two of the urgent reasons why the present revival of the horse industry should be encouraged.

The shortage of draft horses is not confined to Canada. Both the British Isles and the United States are in the same condition and there is a demand from both the countries for Canadian horses. These two important export outlets command the consideration of Canadian breeders.

There is however, available a method whereby much of this type of injury may be eliminated. This method is double-working.

There are some very hardy varieties of long standing which do not show any appreciable amount of trunk injury or sun-scald in the crochets of the main limbs. By using these varieties for the purpose of building the main framework of the trees, and later budding or grafting to the variety desired, much future damage may be avoided.

The demand for horses from the British Isles is principally for sound, weighty, draft geldings, weighing upwards of 1,700 pounds and suitable for heavy transport work in either single or double harness.

There is a demand in Britain for good "vanners," upstanding active, cleanlegged, good-quality horses up to 1,600 pounds for work compared with heavy express work in Canada. For suitable horses high prices are paid. In 1935, for the first time on record a Canadian-bred Percheron stallion was purchased for shipment to Scotland for breeding purposes.

With regard to the United States, besides the many good commercial work horses purchased by American buyers, many sales have been made during the past two years of high-class geldings of show calibre for advertising purposes in the United States. Quoted prices of \$500 per head are not at all unusual in these transactions.
