CANADIAN MINES STAGE COME-BACK

Canada's mineral industry, as a whole, made a striking come-back in 1935, and the output valued at \$308,164,000 was within one per cent. of the peak record of \$310,850,000 in 1929.

Gold led the mineral parade in 1935, with an output valued at \$115,798,000, exceeding that of all other metals by nearly \$10,000,000.

In the non-metallic mineral group, the value of clay products and other structural materials output in 1935 at \$20,026,000 was 30 per cent. lower than in 1932.

On the other hand, fuels and other non-metallics showed a gain of 17 per cent. compared with 1932.

RECORD ELECTRIC POWER PRODUCTION

Hydro-electric power production in Canada during 1935 established a new high record, showing a gain of 10.6 per cent. over the previous high production year of 1934.

The firm-power made available in Canada for ordinary use computed by deducting the sum of exports of the United States and the amount supplied for use in electric boilers, was 15,756 million kilowatt hours, a gain of 8.4 per cent. over the 14,574 million kilowatt hours made available in 1934.

The use of hydro-electric power has grown rapidly in Canada, playing a prominent part in the development of Canadian industries.
