At the meeting of the Acton Community "Y" Board of Directors on Monday evening, Mr. Harry Ballantyne, Associate General Secretary of the National Council was present.

Arrangements were completed for the Acton Radio Club to make their headquarters in the Y.M.C.A. and function as a part of the activities of the Y. An amateur broadcasting station will be installed by the club and a room will be arranged for the work. William Near, one of the club members, has been granted his certificate of proficiency. A complete report of the seven months' operation of the Y, as furnished by the General Secretary, Mr. A. MacLaren, shows that the activities of the Y are being used by the most of the membership and as a community centre. The by-laws governing the Acton Y.M.C.A. were passed by the Board and the fiscal year closed on April 30th. The annual meeting and election of Directors will be held on May 27th this year.

Council Considers Adoption of Plan for Collection of Garbage

Citizens Are Making Nuisances in Depositing Refuse in Various Places—Payment May be Assessed with Other Collections—Repairs at Main Street Bridge will be Considered at Special Meeting—Accounts and Routine Business Occupy Attention of Council

The regular meeting of the Acton Council was held on Monday evening in the Council Chamber. Councillors J. E. McMillan, A. Mason and F. J. McCutcheon were present. In the absence of the Reeve, Councillor McMillan was appointed Acting Reeve.

Mr. A. E. Wilson, of Toronto, was present to discuss the reopening of the existing Public Liability policy for the town. Mr. Wilson was representing the Lloyd's Insurance Co., of London. The policy was renewed at the old premium cost of \$100. Mr. H. L. McDonald is the Acton agent for this company, and the policy was renewed through its Acton representative.

A letter was presented from Beardmore Leathers, as follows:

To the Reeve and Councillors of The Corp. of the Village of Acton Gentlemen:

We notice that household refuse is being dumped rather indiscriminately around the town and more particularly on the edge of the pond, along the creek and on our own property at the foot of John and Elgin Streets.

We think this should be drawn to your attention so that the matter can be brought under proper control. In the first place, it may affect the general health of the community, and secondly, it is causing difficulty in the operation of our tannery.

We understood that in allowing our Crescent property to be used as a dumping ground, the Corporation would prevent other town property from being used as such.

We are having notices painted and installed on our property at the foot of John and Elgin Streets, forbidding dumping, and would ask your co-operation in having the local police keep a sharp lookout for the persons who are constantly dumping there (especially after dark) as the land thereabouts is becoming an eyesore.

POLICE CATCH TRIO WANTED IN GUELPH

Ending a hectic chase between Mount Pleasant and Brampton, after a Guelph garage had been broken into and a car stolen, three men were arrested by police Friday morning. The capture of the trio was effected when a blowout forced their car into a culvert and Provincial officers pursued them on foot, firing shots to warn them.

The men held gave their names as Russell Weisinger, 23, of Guelph, and Robert Johnson, 25, and Charles Williams, 19, of Toronto. They were taken back to Guelph by Acting Chief Duncan to face charges of breaking and entering and theft.

Provincial Constable T. H. Owens, Traffic Officer Ray Hodgson and Constable Ernest Armstrong recognized the occupants in a car near Mount Pleasant, which was proceeding towards Brampton. They chased them at a fast clip and at the junction of No. 10 and 7 Highways, a blowout forced the fugitives into the ditch.

The three jumped out of the car and started to run across a field. Traffic Officer Hodgson captured Johnson and when shots were fired in the air to warn the others, Weisinger surrendered. A car was thrown around the area and later in the day, through information given by a farmer, Williams was caught near the sixth line by Hodgson and Chief Andrew Herke.

Primeau obtained his freedom when he fled through a ground floor window in the jail office. He has not been recaptured. The changes are to become effective in May.
