Pill out only one form. Make out only one cheque. Having filled out the form, take it cr send it to the federal income tax office in your district. The exemptions in general are exactly the same as for federal purposes. With certain exceptions, an unmarried person is exempt to the amount of \$1,000, u married person to the extent of \$2,000. Exemption is \$400 for each dependent child, and there are other exemptions covering the exact amounts paid for the support of various other dependents.

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
