## Milton Won in High School Meet

### Held at Georgetown on Saturday — Winners of Events

Several scholars of Acton High School participated in the Athletic Meet on Saturday at Georgetown of the High Schools of Northern Hamilton. Milton won the meet, with a total of 321 points, against 105 by Georgetown and 60 by Acton.

At the meeting of the Acton Council on Monday evening, Councillors A. Mason, J. E. McMillan, P. J. McCutcheon were present, and Reeve C. H. Harrison presided.

Mr. Kohl and Mr. Salt were present to discuss with the Council the advisability of cleaning up the creek. This refuse deposited there was creating a menace to the public health.
