ACKNOWLEDGE THE DEBT

A venerable clergyman of Virginia said lately, "Men of my profession see much of the tragic side of life. Beside a death-bed the secret passions, the hidden evil as well as the good in human nature, are very often dragged to the light. I have seen men die in battle, children and young wives in their husbands' arms, but no death ever seemed so pathetic to me as that of an old woman, a member of my church. "I knew her first as a young girl, beautiful, gay, full of spirit and vigor. She married, and had four children; her husband died and left her penniless. She taught school, she painted, she sewed; she gave herself tirelessly to eat or sleep. Every thought was for her children, to educate them, to give them the same chance which their father would have done. "She succeeded; sent the boys to college, and the girls to school. When they came home, pretty, refined girls and strong young men, abreast with all the new ideas and tastes of their time, she was a wornout, commonplace old woman. They had their own pursuits and companions. She lingered among them for two or three years, and then died of some sudden failure in the brain. The shock woke them to a consciousness of the truth. They hung over her as she lay unconscious in an agony of grief. The oldest son, as he held her in his arms, cried: "You have been a good mother to us! "Her face colored again, her eyes kindled into a smile, and she whispered, "You never said so before, John. "Then the light died out and she was gone! "How many men and women sacrifice their own hopes and ambitions, their strength, their life itself, to their children, who receive it as a matter of course, and begrudge a care, a word of gratitude, in payment for all that has been given them. Boys, when you come back from college, don't consider that your only relation to your father is to "get as much money as the governor will stand." Look at his gray hair, his uncertain step, his dim eyes, and remember in whose service he has grown old. You can never pay him the debt you owe but at least acknowledge it before, it is too late.

MINES CREATE MARKETS FOR FARMERS

Mining occupies a key position in the economic structure of Canada, not only because of the immense wealth its products create annually, but also through the strong support the mineral industry affords to other industries. Just as the opening of the Canadian West for agricultural settlement created new home markets through the building up of a new country, the mineral industry today is creating new and potential markets by the opening up of the Dominion's great metal-bearing areas. In the wake of the prospector new towns and settlements are springing up in non-agricultural areas, providing markets for agricultural products and creating new business for the railway, lumbering, manufacturing and other industries. The workers and their dependents living in the mining centres and communities of the Dominion provide a very important and profitable market for the Canadian farmer. It is estimated that the staple foods used by these people provide the farmer with a direct market each year for 38,000,000 pounds of meats, 7,500,000 pounds of lard, 7,500,000 dozen of eggs, 5,500,000 gallons of raw milk or its equivalent in condensed forms, 11,000,000 pounds of butter, 7,500,000 pounds of cheese, 76,000,000 pounds of flour, 7,500,000 pounds of beans, and 114,000,000 pounds of potatoes, together with substantial quantities of fruits, vegetables, poultry, and honey, as well as sugar made from Canadian-grown sugar beets. Canadian-grown wool and hides are used in the clothing and footwear purchases of this mining population, and much of the tobacco used by them is Canadian-grown.
