

WISHERIES EXPORTS GAIN

Canada's export trade in fisherles products in 1935 was ten per cent. greater in value than in the previous year. Total foreign sales by the fishing industry amounted to \$24,838,808 compared with \$22,486,863 in 1934, an increase of \$2,-351,945. November was the peak month in the fish export business, with sales totalling \$3,497,500, while the "low" was in April, when the exports were valued at \$1,028,000. Exports to the United States, the nearest and biggest single narket, totalled \$10,314,300 compared with \$9,279,800 a year ago, and shipments of all kinds to Great Britain were valued at \$6,745,700 compared with

\$5,537,600. Better sales of fresh and frozen fish and canned fish were responsible for the the year. Export shipments of fresh and net increase in total export business for frozen fish had a value of almost \$9,150,-000, most of which went to the United States. Exports of canned salmon, lobubers, and sardines-the three main products in the Dominion's canned . fish classification-had a value of \$8,768,-150. A feature of the business in canned salmon was an increase of more than \$896,000 in siles to the British market and \$586,500 in sales to Australia. Sales of dried fish and pickled fish and fish meal showed a decline, while the business in fish oils showed some gain.

PEOPLE OF GREAT BRITAIN USING MORE CANNED FRUIT

ncrease in Great Britain, 1935 registerng an increase of 7 per cent, in imports over the previous year. The total value of imports for 1935 was approximately \$30,285,000. At the top of the list are canned peaches, with pears a close second, followed by pincapples, grapefruit, fruit salad, apricots, apples, loganberries, cherries. Empire fruits show a 94 per cent, increase over the average for the 1926-30 period. Imports from Canada were six times those for 1930, with years in the lead and accounting for 41 per cent, of the total, according o the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Rallways. Canned apples rank next, followed by plums, pectin, loganberries. One of the interesting developments of the year was the substantial exports from Canada o canned atrawberries, due to short crops in Britaln and Holland, other small fruits and rhubarb. The United States occupies the leading position in the case of canned apples, although Canada, which shares the trade with the United
