But why not go a step further and serve more elaborate gelatine dishes? Instead of serving a simple gelatine mold, or one containing a few places of fruit, prepare something so attractive that even guests will regard it as a cultnary masterplece.




CHINESE FAMILY SYSTEM HOLDS CHINA TOGETHER

Living and industrial conditions in China with her millions of people present a rather bewildering spectacle to western eyes. China is very old and her people have gone through some strange experiences during the centuries ahe has existed as a country. With the devastating floods that have occurred, coupled with epidemics that rage from time to time along with upheavals in government one wonders how the people have managed to retain any semblance of unity. Yast year some 10,000 square miles of country were inundated in Central China millions of people were homeless and there was a property damage, including crops, estimated at over 500 millions of dollars. The great strength of China seems to be in her family system which has endured through the centuries and tends to prevent that disintegration that one might quite naturally expect in the face of such happenings. The workers are paid extremely low wages in comparison with other countries. In Shanghal, for instance, where the highest rates prevail, the wages faid in the leading industries for an average day of ten hours are, shipbuilding, 41 cents; hoslery 16 cents; flour milling, 14 cents; cotton spinning, 13 cents, silk reeling, 9 cents; Exports to the United States since the according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Scale on house plants

Scale insects may be planning an attack on your favorite rubber plant, ferns or any other sturdy mants you may have in your home. Scale insects will be found plong the branches and on the under side of the leaves, as shown in the above Garden-Graph. They are usually quite noticeable along the veins of the leaf. Study the Garden-Graph carefully and then examine your house plants to see if they are in-

fested. Scrub any infected plant with mixture of one-fourth ounce of whale oil soup dissolved in a quart of water. Scrub the foliage and branches until the scale loosens and falls off. After this treatment give the plant w cold water bath to clean the whale oil solution out of it's
