It is expected that work will be begun this week on the installation of the new organ for the United Church, Acton, which is to be ready for the first of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Gordon (nee the Diamond Jubilee Services, on Sunday, June 14th. Incidentally, the Committee have handed out the specifications for the organ, which will be scanned with interest by anyone who has any knowledge of the technical construction of pipe organs.
