Acton Ball Team showed the fans how they really could play ball on Wednesday night, when they whitewashed Georgetown, 10-0. Norm Morton held the visiting leads to four safeties, and gives perfect support in the field, the boys turning in a first class performance. The game nearly turned into a farce in the fourth frame, when it looked very much like rain and Acton tried to get out to the four and a half innings could be played to make it a game.
