

### Reign Ended



Possibly the last chapter in the romantic but sorrowful tale of Jas. Conlon of Hamilton, last "King of the Irish," was written in Hamilton police court, when it was announced that Conlon had been ruled mentally deficient, and ordered to remain in the Ontario hospital indefinitely. 'The 72-year-old patriarch with his flowing white beard, has for the past three years, been a familiar figure in Wentworth county courts. When Conlon's sister died. she left almost her entire estate to the Roman Catholic church. Her estate consisted of many bonds. and for years the courts have been trying to get the bonds from the old man, who claims they were entrusted to him by his mother to carry out a secret mission concerned with the grave of his ancestor, King Heber of Ireland. The bonds have never been found. Conlon was arrested trying to sell one of them in Galt, Ontario. When arrested, it is alleged he was wearing a money belt in which was found \$5,000. The church 'is reported to have recovered \$2,500 of this.
