Biblical illustration, the story of the rich young ruler, was used to illustrate the point. It isnot abundance of wealth that constitutes

the greatness of man. 'The world hasn't yet learned the way of Jesus. There are men and women. like Paul, Kagawa, Milton, Plorence Nightingale, Joan of Arc, and others why have learned to follow Him and found the fuller life. Are we in the home life, in the every day tasks, following His Spirit? Are we taking or share of the heavy tasks and practising His spirit? The speaker felt that our religion amounted to naught if we fulled to prace tise the theory we profess.

The cause of athelsm, communism and the like is based on this lack of practise of our Christian teaching. We must think of the individuals about us. It is the only way in which the Kingdom of God can come. The nationalism of the world and the militarism of the nations is directly contrary to the Spirit of Jesus. We must find Him anew and create a Christian society on earth. The challenge was just as impelling as the challenge for services to the soldier. If we do this the accomplishment will surpass anything that has gone before. On Sunday evening Rev. Charles Hac-
