The Township Rate was set at 3 mills for the fifth year in succession, while the rate for Rockwood dropped from 15:6 to 15 mills. Eden Mills and most of the School Section rates were unchanged, Act necessitated an increase of 2-10 of u mill in the General School rate.

A resolution was passed continuing the long established policy of striking off no dogs after the annual Court of Revision. The Council carefully surveyed the

situation regarding arrears of taxes, and in the few unsatisfactory accounts, it was ordered that the necessary steps be taken to collect.

The Clerk was instructed to notify z ratepayer of his liability for damage to the road by obstructing the natural flow of water through his farm. Accounts passed amounted to \$1,751.45,
