The Attorney-General reminded Halton Liberals that the government has got down to work and handled the Hydro problem-"and you people will get the results before the end of the year."

To Mr. Thomas A. Blakelock, Haltonrepresentative in the Provincial House, went the honor of introducing the Premier to the audience. He was proud of his leader and the achievements of the government. He had no excuses to offer and every election promise had been fulfilled. He pointed with justifiable pride to many of these pledges, such as mothers' allowance with one child; report of examination fees; government payment of all the charges on provincial highways, and other enactments for the benefit of the common people.

The Premier, in his address in dealing with the school tax law, said the new Conservative leader would not dare, if returned to office, to repeal the school tax law.
