And the boys deserve it, with the comeback they have shown.

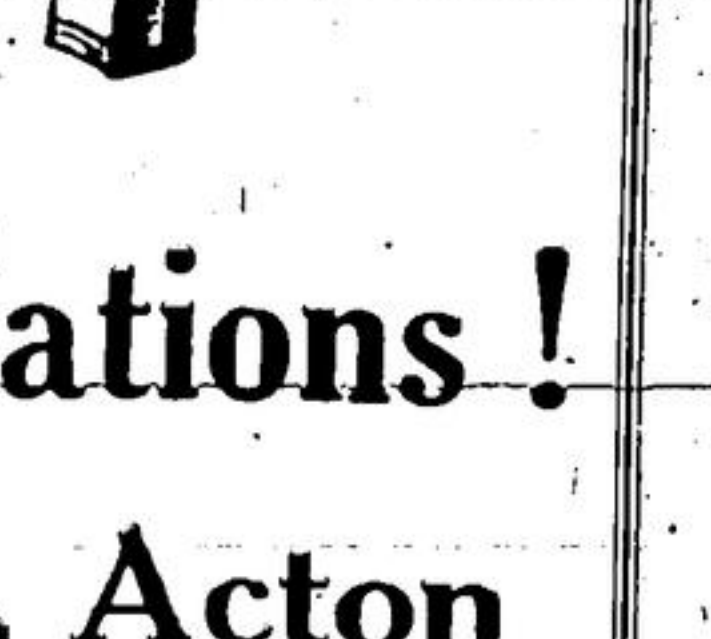
