aneous, 2.07 mills. Taxes are due and payable on September 17th and November 18th, with penalties applicable within two weeks after these dates.

A letter was read from the Compensation Board, relative to covering Municipal employees. It was pointed out that the Clerk should also be covered and the Clerk had written for further information. The matter was left over until a reply was received.

The list of tax arrears was presented by the Clerk for the period of the Council. The Clerk was instructed to write those who were liable for tax sale, notifying that proceedings for sale would be instituted according to law.

The application of the subsidy from the Provincial Government was signed by the Reeve and officials, as required. This will secure a mill, to be applied on the rate.

Permit was given for the removal of a tree on Agnes Street, opposite Mr. George Huill's property.

Details in connection with the laying of a new cement walk on Main Street, between Mill Street and West Tower Avenue, were discussed by the Council. This walk was on the east side of the street.
