Will be opened for the Season of 1875, for the entertainment of Families and Single Gentlemen, and will be kept in a style which cannot fail to make it one of the most Popular Family Hotels in the North West.

The suites of apartments and single rooms in this hotel are large, airy, well ventilated, elegantly furnished, and over-look a landscape of rare beauty and attractiveness; while the spacious parlors, halls and extensive piazzas impart a charming sense of freedom and comfort.

No place of summer resort, in the vicinity of Chicago, presents greater attractions, commanding, as it does, a magnificent view of lake Michigan and its picturesque and beautiful shores, diversified by deep, wooded ravines, which give to the landscape that wild grandeur which, in other localities, is produced by hills and mountains.

Those who are not familiar with this feature of our lake-shore landscapes, can hardly conceive of their exquisite beauty, or appreciate the charms, on a summer day, of these deep ravines densely shaded with magnificent and stately trees.

Some of these ravines are penetrated with carriage roads and bridle paths, communicating with the lake-shore, affording ample opportunity for riding or driving. On the lake-shore there is a pier which furnishes facilities for the landing of pic-nic parties, and makes a safe anchorage for yachts.

The plan upon which the house is to be kept is partly American and partly European. A charge will be made for each room or suite of rooms, according to size and location; and a separate and uniform

charge per week, or per day, for the table; the dinners being served on the *table d'hôte* plan, which obtains in hotels abroad, under the direction of an accomplished caterer.

This method is deemed the most equitable, and it is believed will prove most acceptable, as it will enable those who wish the most spacious and eligible apartments, to have them by paying only the additional charge for the rooms, and those who wish to economise, to do so by occupying less expensive rooms, or by placing more persons in a room.

The former guests of the Hotel, and others desiring rooms for the summer, and gentlemen residing at Highland Park, in the vicinity of the Hotel, who wish to avoid the annoyance of housekeeping and maintaining a corps of servants for the table, are invited to communicate with us in regard to terms for the summer.
