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Mortgage—Crops.—A mortgagor in possession is entitled to the crops grown on the mortgaged lands, and has a right to sever them at any time prior to the destruction of his title by sale under the mortgage. *Willis v. Moore*, Sup. Ct. Texas, 1 *Denver Law Jour.* 228.

Judgments.—A collusive judgment may be inquired into collaterally; but judgments obtained by the collusion of both parties are to be distinguished from those obtained by the fraud of the plaintiff. The former are void as to creditors only, and may be attacked collaterally, while the latter can be impeached by the defendant only, in a direct proceeding. *Meckley's Appeal*, Sup. Ct. Pa., 40 *Leg. Intell.* 336.

Negligence.—In an action for damages for an injury, it is error to leave the question of negligence on the part of the defendant company, to the jury, when the testimony is uncontradicted that the officers of the company performed their whole duty. *Reading etc. R. R. Co. v. Ritchie*, Sup. Ct. Pa., 40 *Legal Intelligencer*, 344.

Lease.—Where a lessee covenanted to a certain rent, and the gas bills at the rate of three dollars per 1000 feet."

held, that the landlord could include the amount due for gas in his distress. *Fernwood Masonic Hall Ass'n v. Jones*, Sup. Ct. Pa., 40 *Legal Intelligencer*, 343.

Insurance.—A covenant in an insurance policy that it shall be void if the property becomes encumbered by a judgment, is violated by the entry of a warrant of attorney annexed to a bond in which the insured is obligor, although the conditions of the bond has never been broken, and there was no time in which execution could have issued on the judgment. *Hill v. Penn. Mut. F. Ins. Co.*, Sup. Ct. Pa., 40 *Legal Intelligencer*, 343.

Special verdict.—A special verdict must state facts essential to the entry of a judgment upon it. It can not be aided by intendment, or a reference to extrinsic facts, appearing on the record. *Kincald v. Schultz*, Sup. Ct. Pa., 40 *Leg. Intell.* 329.



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
