law, as interpreted by the courts, is
against his holding that position we
should know it, and not take any
risks. There is no party politics, no
personal motives or anything of the
kind in it—it is purely a matter of
law, and good logical opinion should
be taken at once, and abide by the
decisions thus obtained. It is not a
question of what any man, or men,
or the voters of the town want, but
one of law; let us find out that if we
can from some men who know.
