SCHOOL-GIRL WISDOM.

When you read the following succinct and suggestive piece of biography, written by a young damsel, a pupil in one of the Philadelphia public schools, you may be able to guess why the enterprising and sagacious young men of that city come to Highland Park for their brides:

"George Washington was born Feb. 12, 1726. He was educated at West Point, and after graduating served in the Mexican war. When the French and Indian war broke out, he was made captain and general and major and performed many important services.

In 1759 he resigned and married Mrs. Martha Augusta and went to live on his estate at Mount Vernon. In the Virginia legislature, of which he was a member, he took the part against the oppression of England.

In 1843 he was elected president of Congress and took an active part in public affairs. He fought many battles and finally captured General Lee and his whole army April 9, 1865. He finally surrendered to Lord Cornwallis in 1760. The Constitution having been adopted, George Washington was made president of the United States. He served two terms, took cold from riding in the rain and died at Mont Vernon 67 years old."
