SCHOOL-GIRL WISDOM.

When you read the following suc-  
cinct and suggestive piece of biogra-  
phy, written by a young damsel, a  
pupil in one of the Philadelphia  
public schools, you may be able to  
guess why the enterprising and saga-  
cious young men of that city come to  
Highland Park for their brides:

"George Washington was born  
Feb. 12, 1726. He was educated at  
West Point, and after graduating  
served in the Mexican war. When  
the French and Indian war broke  
out, he was made captain and gen-  
eral and major and performed many  
important services.

In 1759 he resigned and married  
Mrs. Martha Augusta and went to  
live on his estate at Mount Vernon.  
In the Virginia legislature, of which  
he was a member, he took the part  
against the oppression of England.

In 1843 he was elected president of  
Congress and took an active part in  
public affairs. He fought many  
battles and finally captured General  
Lee and his whole army April 9,  
1865. He finally surrendered to  
Lord Cornwallis in 1760. The Con-  
stitution having been adopted,  
George Washington was made pres-  
ident of the United States. He  
served two terms, took cold from  
riding in the rain and died at Mont  
Vernon 67 years old."
