IMPORTANT STREET SCHEME.

The following is an abstract of a big and highly important street improvement scheme as presented by Mr. Rice for the street and alley committee at the city council Tuesday evening. In many respects it is the most important and far-reaching scheme presented to the city council since the water works were put in. The scheme practically includes the inhabited portions of the east side and embraces the following features:

First—A road of good substantial macadam, 18 feet wide on most streets, and 25 feet in Port Clinton, St. Johns and Vine avenues; all the rest 18 feet.

SECOND—The cost will be about \$1.25 a foot on each side of the street; thus a 100 foot lot will cost \$125, to be paid spot cash or in seven years. This estimate of cost includes the parkways, and means good, thorough drainage, and hard, solid road bed.

Third—The gravel streets of High-wood, this committee finds, cuts through under heavy teams and will not do here.

FOURTH—These taxes will fall on speculative and improved property alike, and being divided into so many payments—the first one to be made in 1898—will not be heavy or burdensome.

FIFTH The committee have letters by the dozen from prominent citizens and property owners asking for this improvement, and as they are our biggest taxpayers, some heed should be given to their wishes.

SEVENTH—Aldermen Rice, Obee and Fritsch sign this report and recommend its adoption. Here is the designation of the streets for improvement:

TWENTY-FIVE FEET WIDE.

Port Clinton avenue, known as the Sheridan road, from Central ave, northerly to Fort Sheridan; macadam on sand foundation, with brick gutters.

St. Johns avenue, from Central avenue north to Vine street.

Vine avenue, from westerly city limits to Eirst street, and from the Chicago and Northwestern railroad tracks to Port Clinton ave.

EIGHTEEN FEET WIDE.

Linden avenue from the Sheridan road, northerly to Maple avenue; sand foundation, necessary catch basins and drains, but without gutters.

Dale avenue from Prospect ave, to Park ave.
Grand Bluff Place and Belle avenue, entire length.

Ecrost avenue from Shoridan to Prospect ave.

Forest avenue, from Sheridan to Prospect ave. Lake avenue, Hazel ave to Laurel ave. Lake Place, from Laurel ave to Central ave. Maple avenue, from Port Clinton ave to Lin-

den ave. Elm Place, from St. Johns ave to Linden ave. Linden Park Place, entire length. Park avenue, from St. Johns ave to Grand

Bluff Place.

Hazel avenue, from St. Johns ave to Lake ave.

Ravine avenue, from St. Johns ave to Forest ave.
