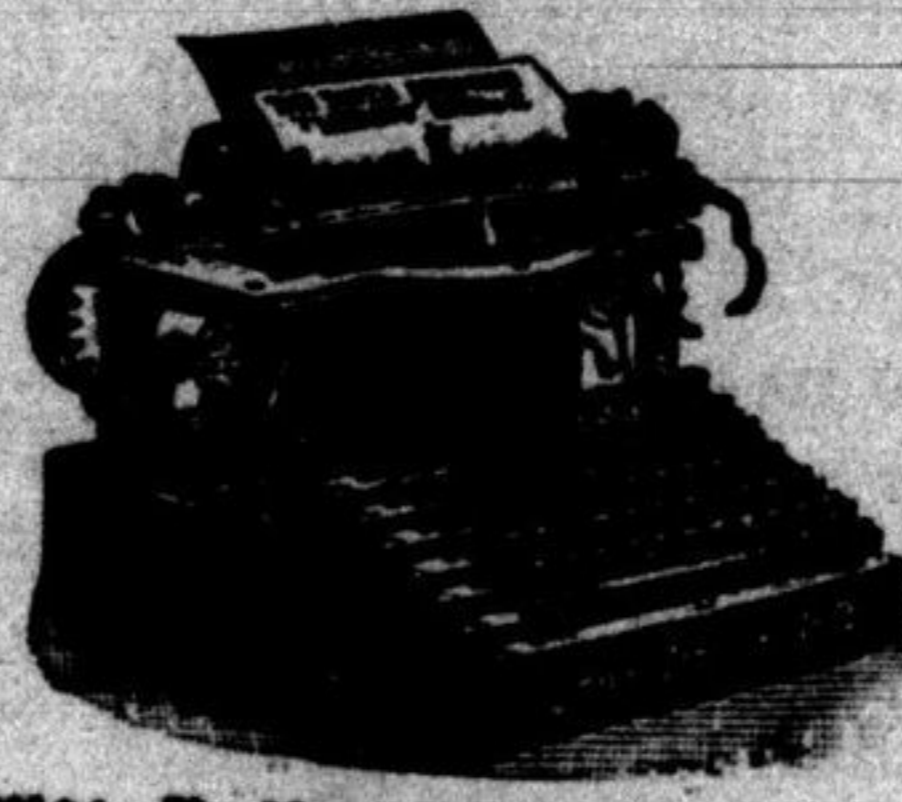

The regular meeting of the board was held last Tuesday. After the approval of the minutes, bills and salaries amounting to \$95 for labor were ordered paid. Also electric light man and police salaries were ordered paid. The treasurer's report shows a balance on hand of \$3,067.04. Bills to be paid, \$1,272, remainder, \$1,795.04. Still due from county treasurer over \$1,500. An order was drawn for Orrin V. Stokey for \$1,100 to be delivered to him when the title of the lot for city hall should be transferred free of incumbrance to the village. A recess was taken until next Tuesday to give the various heads of commtttees time to make up their estimates for the next tax levy. Plans for a \$4,000 brick city hall, submitted by Grudevant, were examined and will probably be accepted if the working plans are satisfactory.
