Robert C. Raffin has a new \$1.00 watch, which has run one week very well; as to the future, no man knoweth.

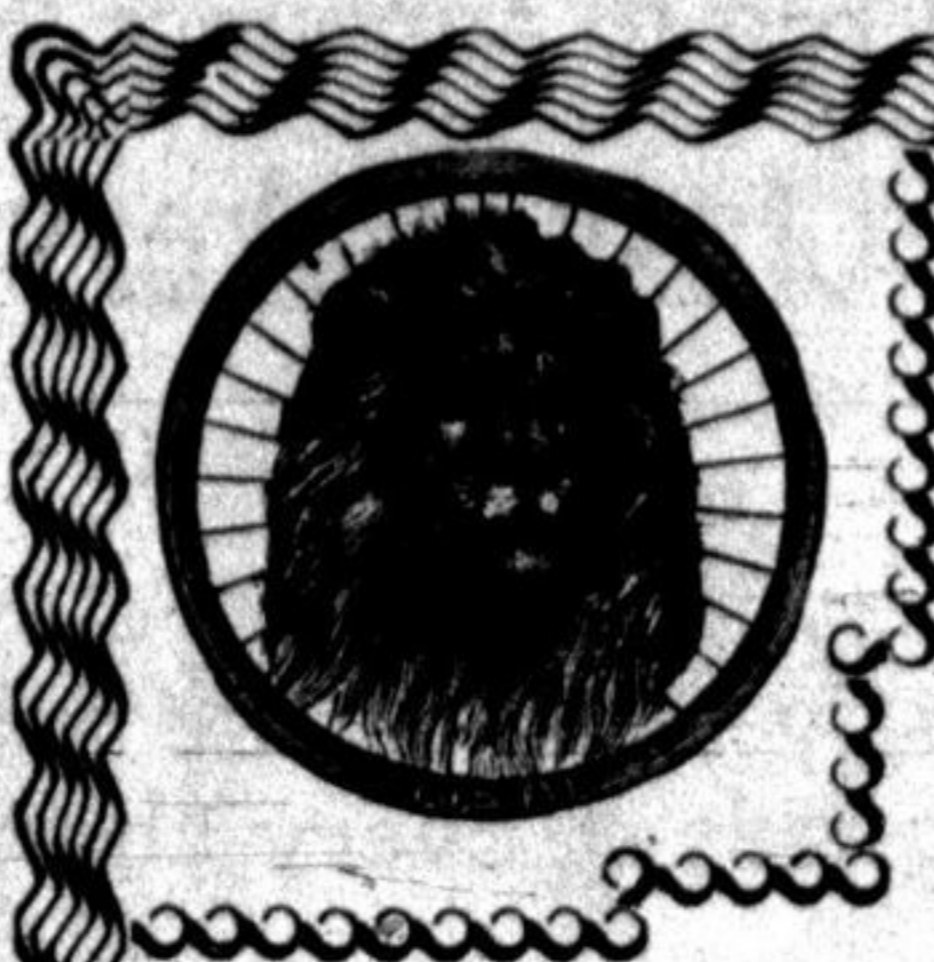

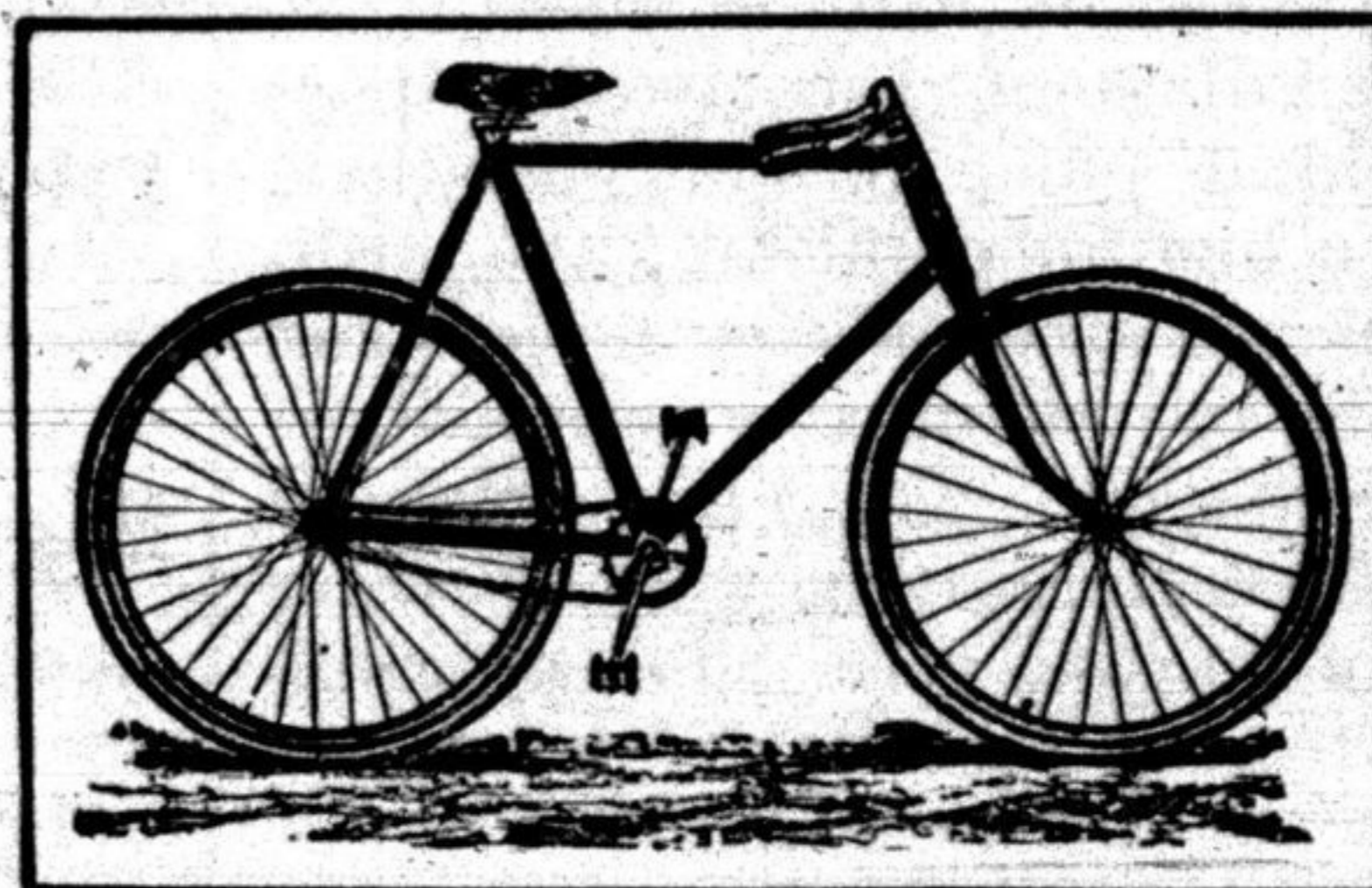
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
