A SWELL SCHOOL HOUSE.

Some people seem to think a \$30,-000 high school house is extravagant for us. Read this of one the old Puritan city is going to build:

Boston is going to have a new public school named after Paul Revere, which will cost, including the site, about \$350,000. The building will be in light pink granite, gray, red and white brick and terra cotta, and will contain public bathing facilities for the children. The northeast corner of the basement is set aside for the girls' bathing room, containing dressing closets and ten bathing compartments, while the northwestern corner is to be fitted up with toilet, dressing and bath rooms for the boys. Each bathing compartment on the girls' side contains a Gegenstrom shower bath, with a seat and foot bath. The boys' bathroom is separated by curtains from their general dressing room, and contains eleven Gegenstrom showers ranged around the walls.
