The electric road folks are filling in with bank gravel through Highwood village so that carriages can get on and off the tracks without any trouble.

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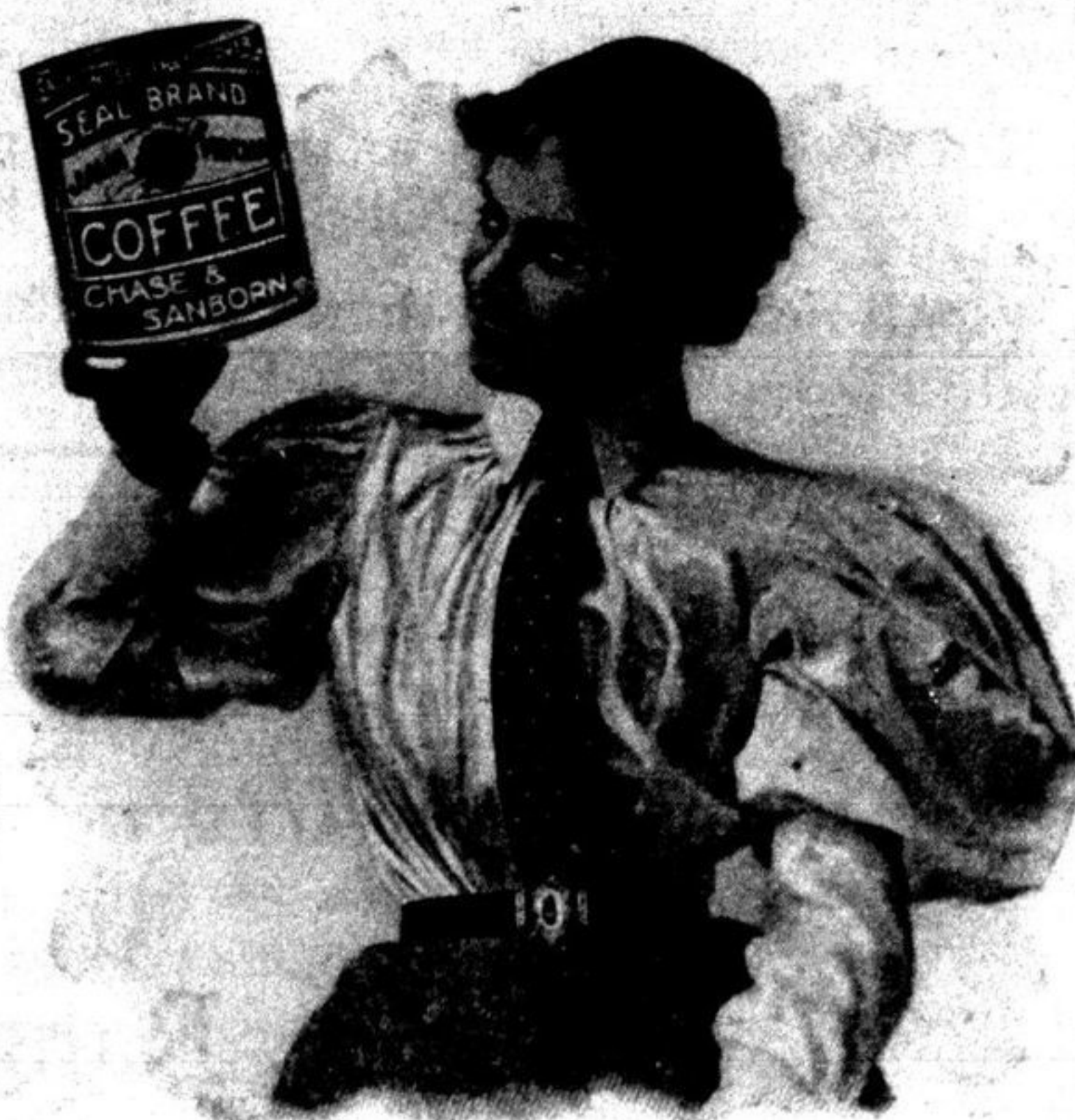
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
