Proceedings of First Regular Session. In executive session the senate on the 12th further discussed the Hawalian treaty. The agricultural appropriation bill was reported with an amendment providing for the inspection of horse meat for export purposes in the same way that the meat of cattle and other animais is now inspected.

By general consent the senate on the 14th postponed consideration of the Hawaiian treaty until next Monday. Senator Hear offered a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution extending the term of office of the president and senators to April 30, 1901, and making that day instead of March 4 the commencement and termination of official terms in future. Nineteen pension bills were passed. An adverse report was made upon H. W. Corbett's claim to a seat in the senate from Oregon....The Lacey bill extending the homestead law to Alaska and granting rights of way to railroads was favorably reported in the house and the agricultural appropriation bill was passed.
