CAUGHT NAPPING.

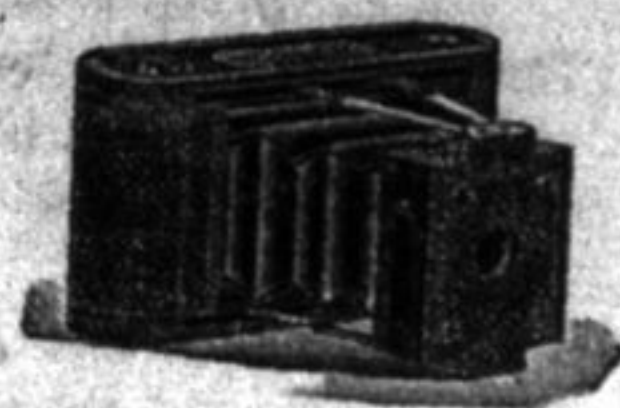
