INTELLIGENCE FROM ALL PARTS CONGRESSIONAL

Proceedings of First Regular Session By a unanimous vote the senate on the 9th passed the \$50,000,000 defense bill without debate. Hawalian annexation was considered in executive session.... In the house af bill was introduced appropriating \$100,000 for the return of the bodies of the Maine victims to the United States and their burial at public expense at such places as the relatives of the deceased might designate. The committee on rivers and harbors voted not to report a river and harbor appropriation bill at this session.

A bill to revive the grade of lieutenant general in the army was reported favorably in the senate on the 10th from the committee on military affairs. The nomination of William J. Calhoun, of Illinois, to be interstate commerce commissioner, was confirmed. Adjourned to the 14th ... In the house the time was spent on the Indian appropriation bill. The senate amendments were nonconcurred in and the bill sent to conference.

The senate was not in session on the 11th.In the house the bill to pay the Bowman act claims, aggregating \$1,200,000, for stores and supplies furnished the union army during the war, was discussed. The bill for the cession of all arid lands to the states in which they are located was re ported favorably, as was also a joint reso lution amending the constitution providing for the election of members of the house of representatives for terms of four years Adjourned to the 14th.
