AS TOLD BY A SURVIVOR.

An Eye-Witness of the Shawneetown Flood Tells of Horrors of the Situation.

Paducah, Ky., April 5 .-- When death swept down upon Shawnestown on the crest of a mighty flood there were a few who watched its progress and lived to tell the story. One of these eyewitnesses has reached Paducah. The scene he beheld and the sounds he heard will linger like a nightmare in his memory for many a day. Ed Walton left Shawneetown late Sunday night and reached here Monday, coming the latter part of his journey by rail. Possibly of all those in Shawneetown he had the clearest view of the disaster.

Walton says the wall of water, 20 feet high, came without warning. The first intimation he bad was when he heard a roaring behind him to the north as he lounged along the bank of the main levee. Then he saw the yellow torrent of rushing waters coming. He declares that it looked like a low hill, the spreading waters forming the sloping sides and the crest of the flood the top. Walton was near a wharfboat. Realizing what had happened, he ran for that and reached its deck as the waters began to fill the streets and her condition.
