Early action by the committees is expected, but exactly when it may be looked for is not

It is well known that any proposition advanced will be met in the senate with an amendment declaring the independence of the present Cuban government, and to so frame a resolution as to carry a majority of the senate and at the same time meet the recommendations of the president is the result

The conservative senators also met in the afternoon and determined to oppose any radical measure, if it should be reported by the senate committee on foreign relations. They will oppose by debate a recognition of independence of the present government and a declaration of war, and will consent to action only along the lines of the recommendations of the president as to intervention at his discretion.

The temper of the house could not be accurately determined, but there, as in the senate, the proposition for Cuban independence has to be met. Any report from the committee on foreign affairs that does not carry with it this feature will be antagonized by an amendment, and the prospects are that nearly all the democrats and It isn't sea-seasickness. It is known, however, that Senor Polo is keenly sensitive to the language of the message. What its effect will be upon his service here is not known, for no word has yet come as to the effect of the message upon the authorities at Madrid.

MADRID IN AN UPROAR.

Madrid, April 12.-Numerous groups in the Puerta del Sol and in front of the office of the minister of the interior Monday evening raised the cry "Viva Espana!" The gendarmes and police scattered them and Address Allen S. Olmsted, Le Roy, N. Y. occupied the square, but the groups quickly re-formed several times, until finally the gendarmes charged the crowd. Many were injured or arrested. Senor Aguilera the civil governor, called out the civil guard to clear the street. Throughout the evening demonstrations continued in various quarters. The police and gendarmes repeatedly dispersed large crowds. Calm was finally restored, but the gendarmes at midnight were patrolling the streets and other precautions were maintained.




